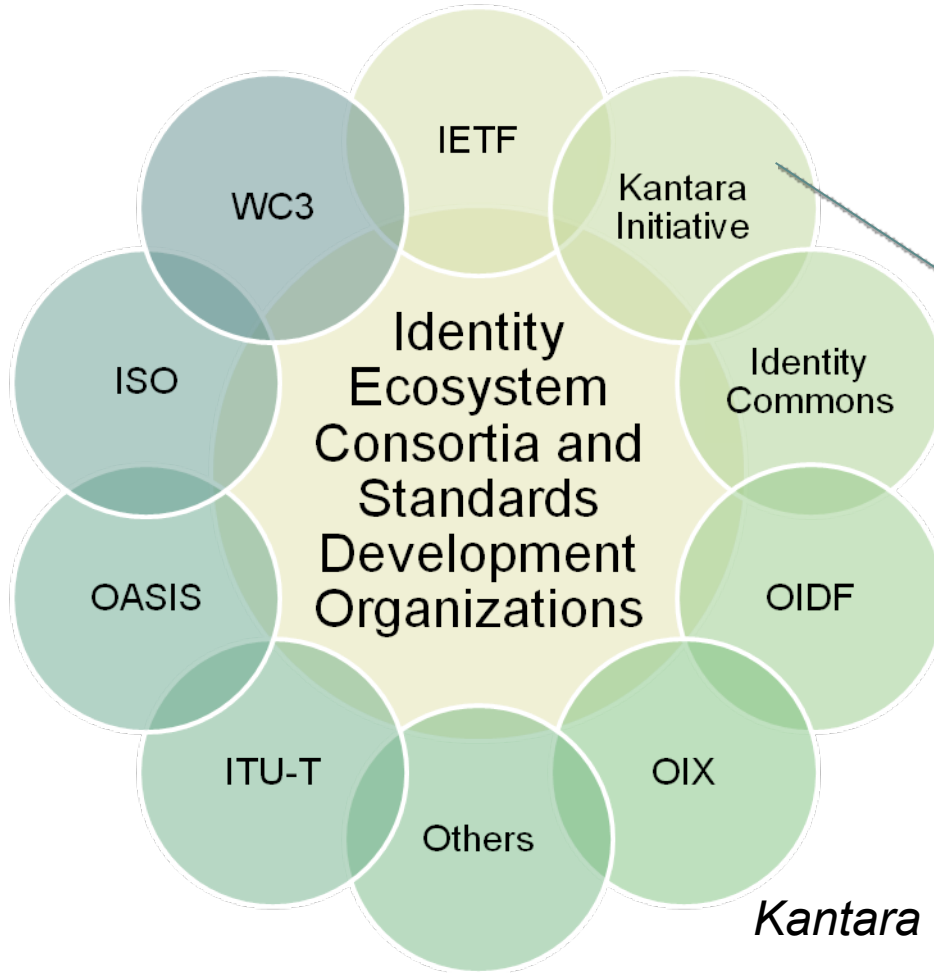

Accreditation and Certification

The Kantara Identity Assurance Framework initiatives are designed to address current and prepare for new technologies with a criteria/policy foundation that supports all comers in identity technology, whether that that technology is in banking, chemicals, engineering or any IT installation.



Where Communities build Trust



Adoption of the Open Identity Trust Framework Model and Certifying Services builds a strong foundation:

- enabling interoperability for federation in the CLOUD
- assuring trust in certified credentials
- reducing risk planning related costs



Where Communities build Trust



- Focusing on issues of impact and relevance to:

Users	• End Users of on-line services and systems
Government Agencies and Jurisdictions	• Representatives from Multi-national Government organizations
Federation Operators	• Central organizations who manage federations
Relying Parties	• An entity that relies upon a subscriber's credentials, typically to process a transaction or grant access to information or a system
Identity Providers	• Organization member of the federation and managing accounts of its users who can access to some of the resources available in the federation
Credential Service Providers	• An electronic trust service provider that operates one or more credential services
Service Providers	• A company who provides a specific internet related service
OpenID Providers	• A Service Provider who leverages OpenID protocol
More	• As the trust space and needs develop we expect this list may grow



United States Government: Open Identity Solutions for Open Government (from GSA)



- The Open Identity initiative seeks to leverage existing industry credentials for Federal use. The Initiative approves credentials for government use through our Trust Framework Providers (TFPs) who assess industry Identity Providers (IDPs).
- The Trust Framework Provider Adoption Process outlines the process that the ICAM community uses to sanctify organizations that assess commercial IDPs.

Identity Assurance Certification Program

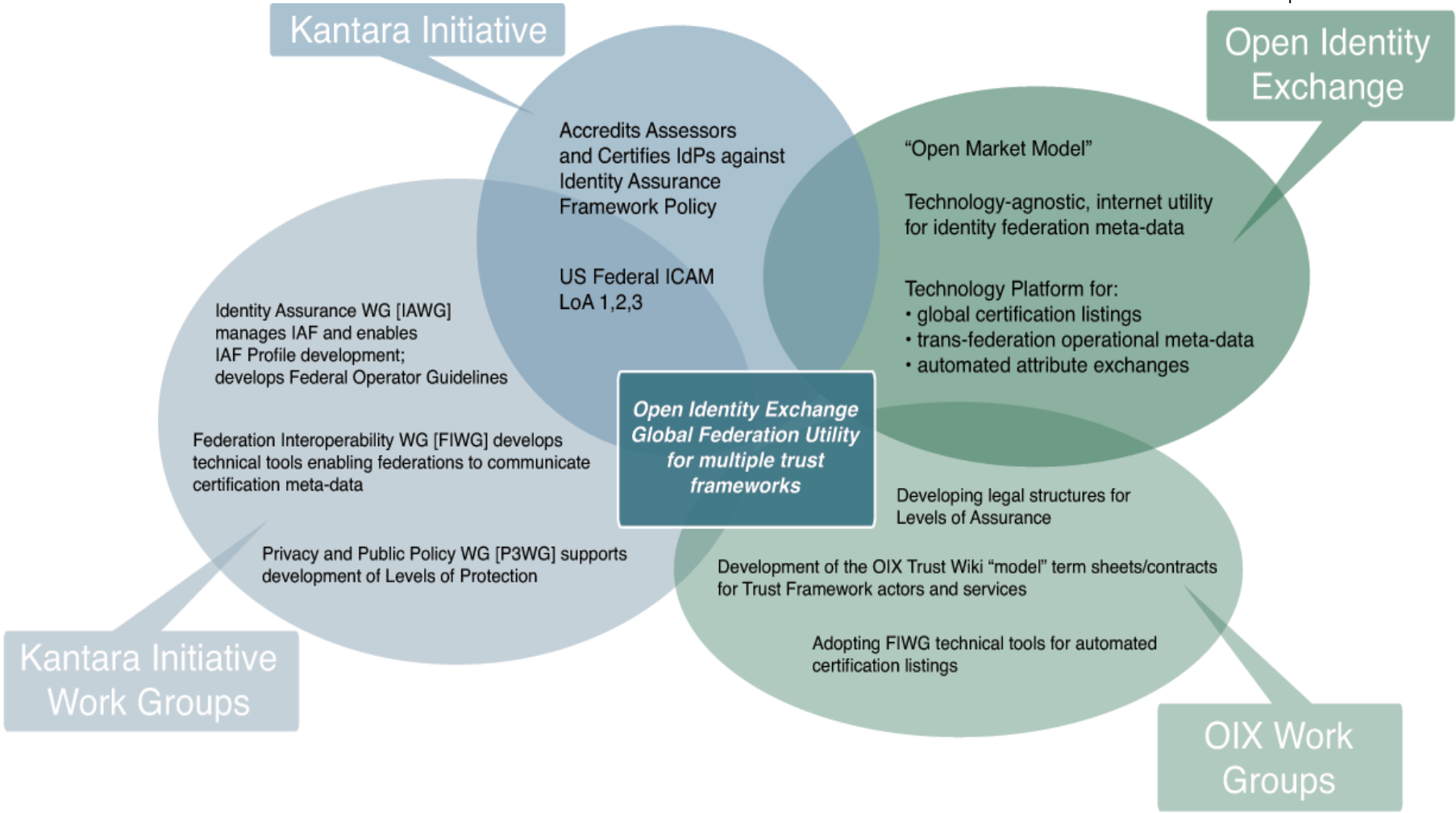
- Kantara Initiative is *the* industry focused TFP providing high Level of Assurance certification

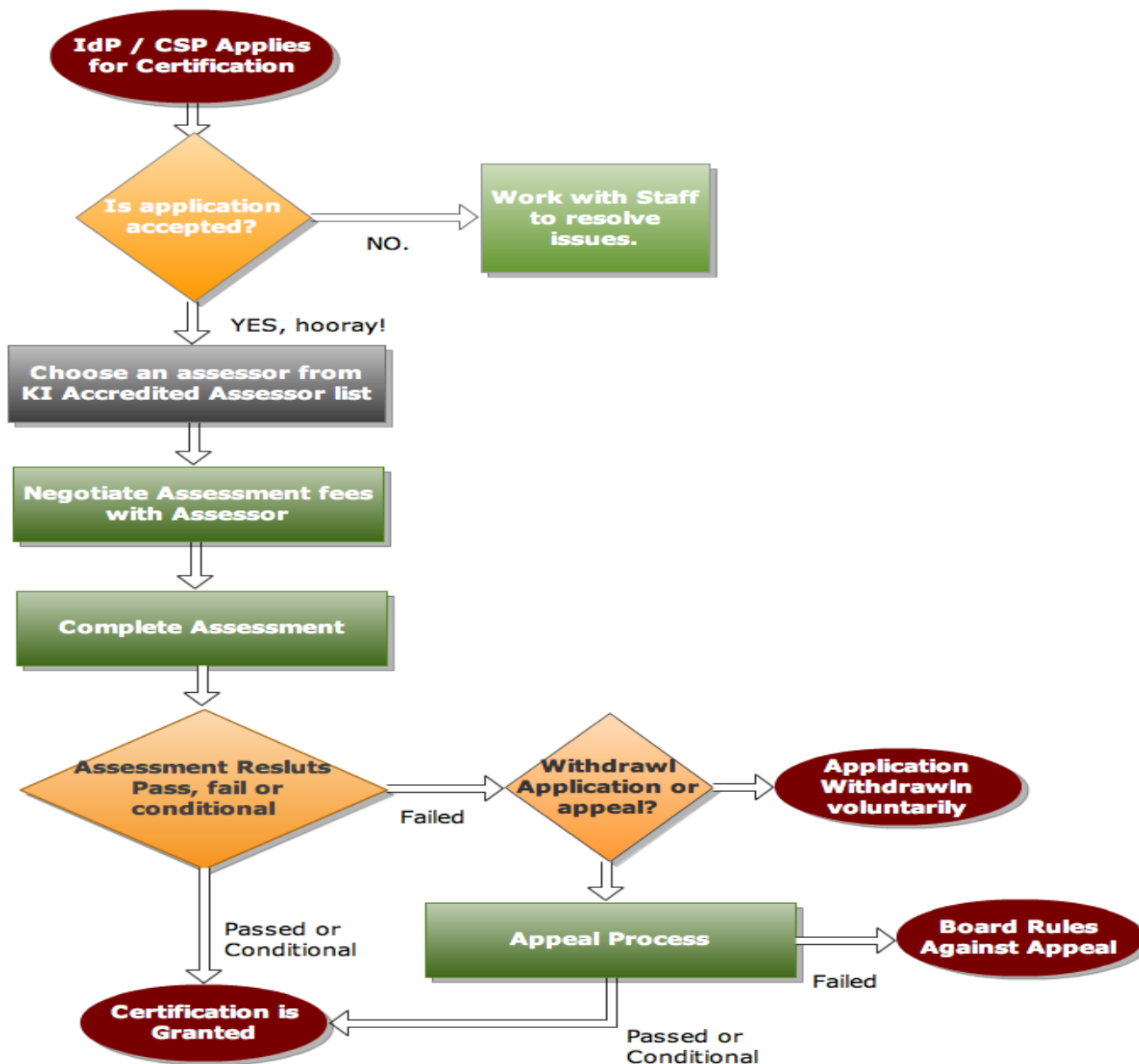
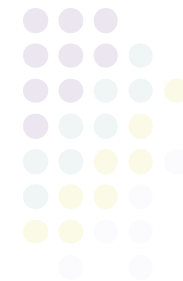
US Government Trust Framework Providers / Collaborative Solutions



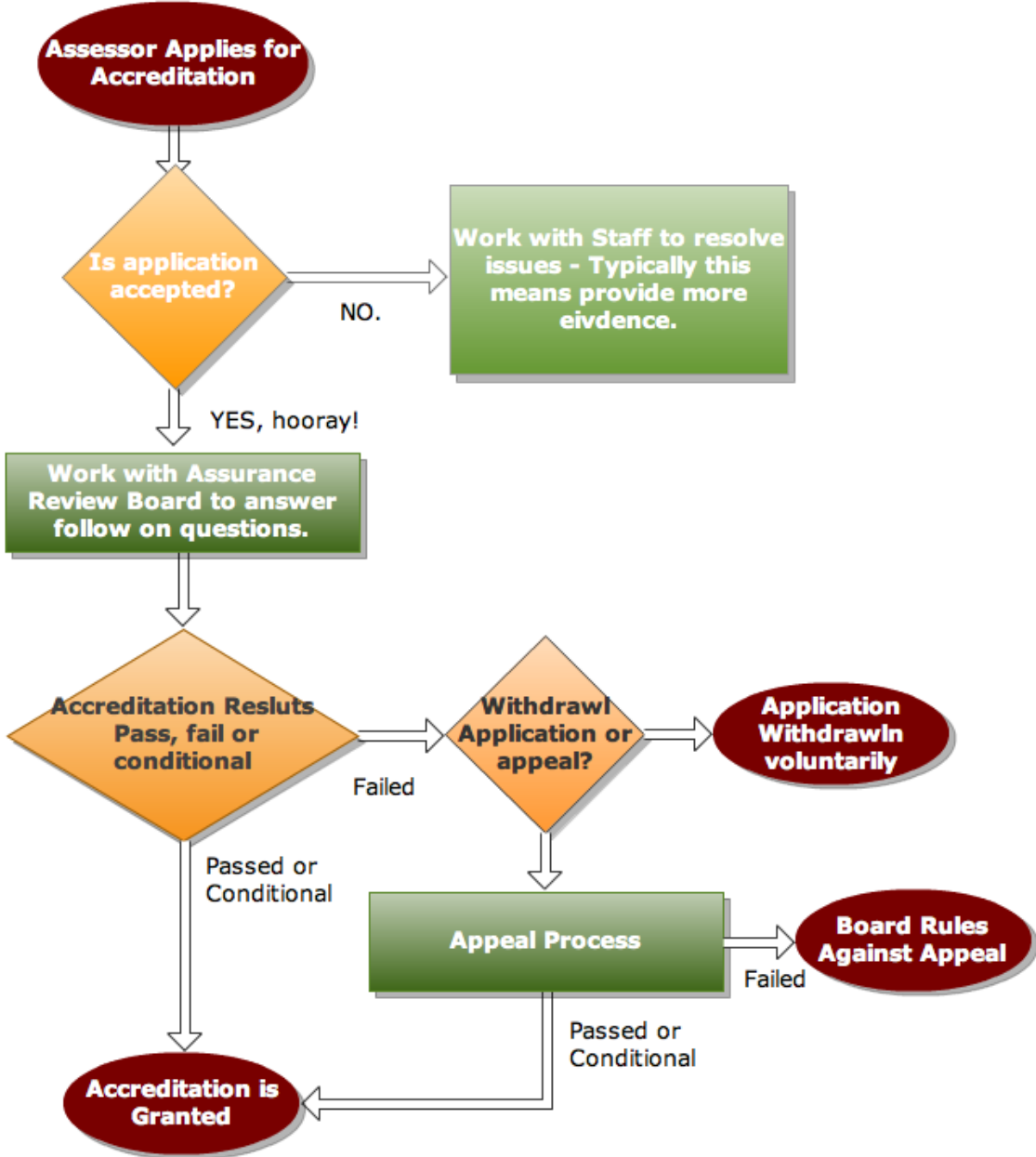

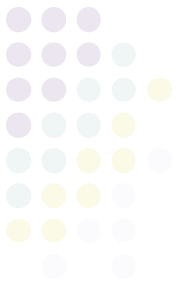
Certification Process: IdP / CSP



Accreditation Process: Auditors and Assessors

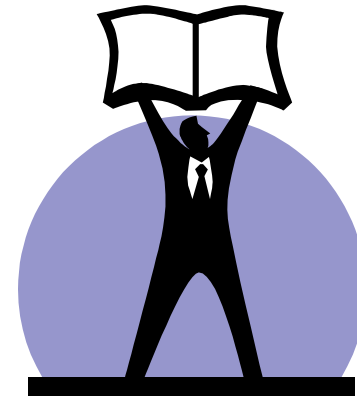

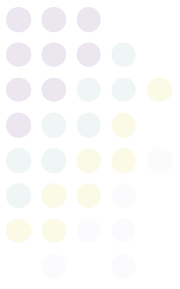
Industry and User Community Converge
