- 15 **Abstract:** Sharing information online can be confusing and expose individuals to
- risks they don't understand. Often, complex details are buried in obfuscated legalese in
- 17 Terms of Service, Terms of Use, and Privacy Policy documents presented elsewhere on
- 18 the website in question. As a result most users avoid reading the fine print, even lying
- 19 about it to access coveted services. The Standard Information Sharing Label is a
- 20 consistent, simple way for organizations to communicate the essential details about use of
- 21 information shared online, so that individuals can make better decisions about what to
- share, when, and with whom.

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## 2 Introduction

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- Websites present the Standard Information Sharing Label to communicate terms of use
- when individuals share information.
- Online Terms of Service (TOS) or Terms of Use (TOU) agreements are confusing,
- obscure, and largely unread by website users.
- The Information Sharing Work Group has been working on a Standard Information
- Sharing Agreement to replace typical TOUs, letting people establish simple terms of use
- 66 for information we share before we share it. Inspired by Creative Commons and USDA
- Nutrition Facts labels, we are developing a minimal legal framework covering the
- 68 majority of situations and visually communicating a binding contract in the simplest way
- 69 possible. Designing the Standard Information Sharing Label is part of that project.
- 70 The Standard Information Sharing Label gives organizations a clear, consistent way to
- 71 present the basics of how they use your data before you share it, just like a USDA
- Nutrition Facts Label gives food manufacturers a clear, consistent way to present the
- basic nutritional details about your food before you buy it: just the facts about who gets
- what data, where it comes from, when they get it, and what it can be used for.
- Armed with this information, individuals will be able to make better decisions about the
- information we share and organizations will get richer, more meaningful relationships
- with their customers, patrons, and citizens.
- We believe most organizations want healthy relationships with the people they depend
- 79 on. The Standard Information Sharing Label makes that easier.

## 3 The Label

The Standard Information Sharing Label presents a consistent visual display of the essential details regarding the use of information shared online.

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A functional example follows (a designed version is under development):

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The Standard Information Sharing Label is presented on web pages or by browsers at the point of sharing information through the use of the Information Sharing Icon, design to be determined. The Icon shall be present, either on the web page, in the browser chrome, or on mouseover of the button which triggers information sharing, e.g., the submit button of a form. Clicking on the Icon shall trigger the display of the Label.

120		Below the title, the label shall explain the request, reading:

124 125 126 127		Following the explanation shall be a simple, two-column table, separated by a rule The first column shall list the Term Names. The second column shall contain the Term Details for this particular instance of sharing. A vertical rule shall separate the columns.

129 130		Optionally, following the table of terms, separated by a rule, MAY be a pointer to more information about the Standard Information Sharing Label, reading

134	3.5	Term Names
135 136 137		The following terms SHALL be present in the Term Names column, unless indicated as "Optional". Optional Terms MAY be present in the Term Names column

### 3.6.2 What 158

159 A description of the Shared Data. Additionally, an optional clickable link may be 160 present, reading "Show Me". If present, clicking on this link will cause the display 161 of the actual data that would be shared (or has been shared in the past).

### 3.6.3 From 162

163 The source of the Shared Data being requested. Additionally, an optional clickable link may be present, reading "Highlight". If present, clicking on this link will 164 165 visually highlight on the web page the particular location of the data input, 166 typically an HTML form element or elements.

238		The information will be used in a mobile or desktop application.
239		The name of the application SHOULD be displayed in parentheses
240		after the term, e.g., Application (Angry Birds).

242 243		Show any additional terms that apply to the Shared Data, including additional uses or rights beyond the Purpose.
244 245 246 247		The following standard terms are preferred (but Data Recipients are free to use other terms when clearer). When possible, Data Recipients SHOULD clarify these terms with the specific brands or services Individuals might recognize in parentheses, e.g., Statistical Aggregation (search trends).
248	3.6.8.1	Statistical Aggregation
249 250		Depersonalized aggregation of the Shared Data may be used to produce services and products for other parties.
251	3.6.8.2	Personalized Promotional Offers
252		The Shared Data may be used by the Data Recipient to tailor
253		advertisements, coupons, or other promotions.
254	3.6.9 Rel	ated Agreements
255 256 257		Reference any applicable legal agreements governing the Terms of Use, Terms of Service, or Privacy Policy. A URL MUST be listed, where individuals can visit to review the associated agreement.
258	3.6.10 3rd	d Party Ratings (User-agent Required)
259		If configured by the Individual, the user-agent may present ratings of the Data
260		Recipient from certified Rating Services. These ratings may be quantitative or
261		qualitative and are completely at the discretion of the Rating Service. The name of
262		the Rating Service and URLs for more information about both the Rating Service
263		and this particular rating MUST be present. The user-agent SHALL render the
264		URLs for pop-up navigation.
265		If there is no user-agent, this row shall not be present.
266	3.6.11 St	orage
267		Present a statement describing the recordation of this particular instance of sharing.
268		If a user-agent is present, display the user configured settings for storing the
269		transaction record. If no user-agent is present, Data Recipients MAY present a
270		location and URL for Individuals to view the data log for Data Shared under this
271		Label.

273 274 275 276	The icon SHALL be present, either on the web page, in the browser chrome, or on mouseover of the button which triggers information sharing. Clicking on the icon shall trigger the display of the label.		
277	4.1 Size		
278	The icon may be presented in any of the following sizes:		
279	4.1.1 8x8		
280	4.1.2 16x16		
281	4.1.3 32x32		
282	4.2 Color		
283 284	The icon SHOULD be presented in color when possible. Monochrome or black and white options are also available.		
285	4.3 Images		
286	One of the following images MUST be used as the icon.		
287	4.4 Mouse Over		
288 289	On mouse over, the icon should present, in the manner of an ALT tag or tool tip, the following:		
290	"View Sharing Terms"		
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293	5 Design
294 295 296 297 298	The Label MUST be presented in an easy-to-read format with a consistent look and feel across all media and devices. The following guidelines define the baseline design parameters that SHOULD be used. If doing so would make the label unreadable or inconsistent due to the particulars of the medium or device, implementers should use their judgment to achieve results that match as closely as possible.
299	5.1 Fonts
300	5.1.1 Font Family
301	All text on the Label shall be Arial, Helvetica, or similar san-serif font.
302	5.1.2 Font Size
303	The Title shall be 24pt.
304	The Explanation and the Afterword shall be 10pt.
305	The Term Names shall be 14pt.
306	The Term Details shall be 12pt.
307	5.1.3 Font-Weight
308	The Title and Term Names shall be bold.
309	The Explanation, Term Details, and Afterword shall be normal.
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311	6	Glossary
312	6.1	Label
313		The Standard Information Sharing Label, as described herein.
314	6.2	Individual
315		The natural person using the website, aka, the user.
316	6.3	Data Recipient
317 318 319		The legal entity receiving the requested data for which this particular label applies. Typically, it's the organization or company that controls the website on which the data is requested.
320	6.4	Data Transaction
321 322		A particular instance of information sharing. Specifically, the transaction for which this particular Label applies.
323	6.5	Shared Data
324		The data to be shared, or actually shared, in the Data Transaction.
325	6.6	Associated Service
326		The website or service for which the Shared Data will be used.
327	6.7	Purpose
328		The specific function for which the Shared Data will be used by the Data Recipient
329	6.8	Website
330 331 332		The site for which data is being requested. This MUST be either the site on which the Label (or icon) is presented, or the site which is clearly indicated as the Data Recipient on the page presenting the Label or Icon.
333	6.9	User-Agent
334		A browser or browser extension that may augment or generate the Label.
